Bennett: Iran covers up its nuclear activity, lies to UN atomic watchdog

In a video posted on social media, PM reads from a stack of secret nuclear documents allegedly stolen from Tehran back in 2018, saying Iran's then-defense minister asked to come up with a cover story for UN's atomic agency

Prime Minister Naftali Bennett said on Tuesday that Iran continues to lie about its nuclear program following the UN nuclear watchdog's report regarding Tehran's stockpile of enriched uranium.

Neither Tehran nor the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) immediately responded to requests for comment about the allegations, which appeared to be part of an Israeli campaign to dissuade big powers from renewing a 2015 Iranian nuclear deal in now-stalled Vienna negotiations.

In a video posted on social media, Bennett read aloud from a selection of the files, allegedly stolen by Mossad, some of them translated into English.

"Iran stole classified (IAEA) documents ... and used that information to systematically evade nuclear probes," he said. "How do we know? Because we got our hands on Iran's deception plan a few years back."

"It is right here in my hands, in the Persian language, hundreds of pages marked with a stamp of Iran's Intelligence Ministry. There are even some handwritten notes on the documents by senior Iranian officials, like this one, written by then-Defense Minister Mohsen Fakhrizadeh."

Bennett quoted an Iranian defense official as writing in the alleged documents that "sooner or later they (IAEA) will ask us, and we'll need to have a comprehensive cover story for them".

A Bennett aide said the latter assertion referred to Israeli spies' publication in 2018 of what they said was a secret trove of documents seized in Iran and related to its nuclear projects. Tehran called that so-called "Atomic Archive" a fabrication.

Iran says its nuclear program is peaceful. Israel, Washington and the IAEA have long made clear that they believe Iran had a coordinated nuclear weapons program until 2003.

Meanwhile, IAEA said that Iran is continuing its enrichment of uranium at levels higher than the 3.67 percent limit set in the 2015 deal.

The IAEA spent more than a decade investigating Iran's past activities, and is now again seeking answers from Iran on the origin of uranium particles found at three undeclared sites.

In a report issued on Monday, the IAEA said it still had questions that were "not clarified" regarding previous undeclared nuclear material at Marivan, Varamin and Turqzabad nuclear sites.

U.S. suspends assistance to Sudan, calls on Israel to condemn coup

Following overthrow of Sudan's civilian government, White House calls on Jerusalem to join the international community 'in vocally pressing for Sudan's military leaders to cede power'; adds U.S. will no longer aid Khartoum in Abraham Accords efforts

The Biden administration has suspended assistance to Sudan, including assistance related to its normalization deal with Israel, and wants Jerusalem to call out the bloody coup that removed the country's civilian government last year.

“The United States is not moving forward at this time with assistance originally committed to Sudan's civilian led transitional government in connection with its efforts to improve Sudan's bilateral relationship with Israel,” a State Department spokesman said in an email Friday in response to a query. “This includes wheat shipments and certain development and trade and investment assistance.”

People take part in demonstrations demanding civilian rule in Sudan's capital of

Jewish Insider first reported the development.

The spokesman noted that the United States also suspended foreign assistance unrelated to the Abraham Accords, the normalization agreements between Israel and four Arab states, because of the coup. He said the Biden administration expected Israel to join in the call for a return to a democratically elected government.

“Any moves made in this regard by Sudan's military leaders would not enjoy credibility with the Sudanese people,” he said. “We strongly encourage the State of Israel to join us and the broader international community in vocally pressing for Sudan's military leaders to cede power to a credible civilian-led transitional government.”

Sudan's military seized power last fall, arresting the country's prime minister. Protesters turned out in force and dozens were killed by security forces in demonstrations.

Israel has not commented on the situation, and a minister in the former civilian government said in Haaretz last month that this will be seen as backing for the coup. The Trump administration in its final months brokered normalization agreements between Israel and the United Arab Emirates, Morocco and Bahrain, as well as Sudan. The full agreement with Sudan has yet to come to full fruition because of instability in the country.

The Biden administration, in one of its few areas of agreement with its predecessor, has committed to advancing the Abraham Accords.

“As for the Abraham Accords, as we’ve said, they are a positive development that have had clear benefits for Israel and the region,” said the spokesman, who spoke on condition that he not be named, as is State Department custom. “The United States will continue to look for opportunities to engage with Israel and other countries to normalize relations and expand cooperation.”

Gantz says Israel should outlaw far-right groups that rioted in Jerusalem

Defense minister says security agencies mulling designating Jewish supremacy group Lehava and far-right soccer hooligans La Familia as terror groups; Bennett, Lapid join in condemnation

Defense Minister Benny Gantz on Monday said Israel should outlaw right-wing extremist groups whose members were involved in unrest on Jerusalem Day and designate them as terror organizations.

Gantz pointed to La Familia — a collective of far-right soccer hooligans — and the Jewish supremacist group Lehava for their alleged involvement in several racist incidents targeting Palestinians during Sunday’s festivities in the capital.

Activists affiliated with the two groups hurled stones and insults at Palestinians during the march from Damascus Gate to the Western Wall.

“I heard the nauseating cries of the minority of participants in Sunday’s events,” Gantz said at the opening of a faction meeting of his Blue & White party. “As defense minister, I believe it is time to examine whether these organizations are terror groups.”

“I know the security agencies are already considering the matter and trust that they will conduct the best examination,” he said, adding that “agitators must be hunted down, wherever they are.”

Prime Minister Naftali Bennett also condemned both groups whom he said shamed and disrupted celebrations and promised they would be brought to justice.

Bennett praised the police for their handling of the Jerusalem Day events in a letter.

“We enforced our sovereignty over Jerusalem and showed that we will act according to what is right for the country and not according to threats made against us,” he wrote, adding that the decision to allow the contentious Jerusalem flag march to go ahead through its traditional route, passing through the Muslim quarter, was the right call.

"Barring a small group of extremists, with whom we will exact justice, celebrations were exhilarating and conducted properly," Bennett said.

Foreign Minister Yair Lapid said the extremists sullied Jerusalem Day events.

"The celebrations should not have violence and abuse by members of La Familia or the blatant racism of Lehava," Lapid said.

"These people are not patriots. We will not let them rob us of our love of country and our Zionism," he said. "They are nothing but bullies who defile the Zionist ideas."

He added the extremists were in the minority and it was "time to put them in their place."

**Ultra-Orthodox institutions teach 'idleness,' says finance minister**

In fresh attack on Haredim, Lieberman says institutions that refuse to teach core curriculum can 'do so at their own expense', plans to cut budget for Haredi schools by over \$120 million

Finance Minister Avigdor Lieberman said Monday that there is "no reason to fund ultra-Orthodox institutes that teach idleness" at a meeting of his center-right Yisrael Beitenu party.

Lieberman — a longtime critic of yeshivot, as well as Haredi schools and politicians — said that institutions that refuse to teach core curriculum subjects such as English and math can "do so at their own expense, but not at the expense of taxpayers."

"They sit there in the kollelim (Talmudic schools for married men), they come in the morning, eat a sandwich, drink a cup of coffee and talk about politics, go through some books and go home."

"The budget is for idle studies, not for sacred studies. We will fight it," said Lieberman, who further explained he wants to cut the budget for these schools by over \$120 million. Yeshiva students

"We go for the minimalist view, and we will not give up."

Knesset member Meir Porush of the Ashkenazi ultra-Orthodox United Torah Judaism faction reportedly criticized Lieberman, whom he said "speaks like a drunk."

"Instead of speaking out against the Arab schools in Israel that teach [Palestinian Liberation Organization] core studies, including those that also teach against the state, he is trying to close ultra-Orthodox schools," Porush continued.

However, UTJ chief Moshe Gafni reportedly asked members of his party not to comment on Liberman's remarks.

Aryeh Deri, the head of the Sephardic Haredi Shas party, was said to have issued a similar directive to the members of his own faction.

Yaakov Amidror says recent Israeli-linked attacks on Iranian assets targeted 'rank-in-file' Revolutionary Guards officers, deviating from rules of engagement Jerusalem itself had set against its arch-nemesis

Israel's former national security adviser warned on Monday that a recent spate of attacks on Iranian assets that were linked to Israel will only make Tehran more determined to harm Israeli targets in revenge.

Yaakov Amidror, a former major general and a current senior fellow at the conservative security think tank the Jerusalem Institute for Strategic Studies, told Ynet that Israel deviated from the rules of engagement it itself had set against its arch-nemesis Iran, citing the assassination of a senior Islamic Revolutionary Guards Corps (IRGC) member and a blast at a sensitive military site in Parchin last week, which were both linked to Israel.

"We have worked very intensively in Syria and Iran in the past — according to foreign sources — from the assassination of the head of the nuclear program to the killing of a senior in the Islamic State, but this time around, we've seen a shift," he said.

"Now, the threat is also against senior 'rank-in-file' officers in the Revolutionary Guards, with a clear goal to exact a personal toll for their actions against Israel.

The Iranians were previously unable to carry out any high-level responses, so maybe they think they've got a score to settle. Maybe through airstrikes, an area in which the Iranians have failed too in the past when they tried reaching Israel with drones that were intercepted in one way or another. The question is how prepared we are for a potential Iranian response."

The hawkish erstwhile general also noted that the travel warning for Turkey issued by the National Security Council (NSC) indicated that Israel had concrete intelligence about an Iranian plot to harm Israelis in the country.

"The NSC alerts Israeli citizens about dangers so they can better consider whether they are willing to risk themselves or not," he said.

Amidror added that most Israelis traveling to Turkey are not in danger and should not cancel their travel plans, but must remain vigilant.

FM offers Suriname, South America, foreign aid to help with severe flooding

South American nation will become fifth country to open mission in Israeli capital; FM offers Surinamese counterpart to send foreign aid to help deal with the impact of severe flooding

Suriname is planning to open an embassy in Jerusalem soon, Foreign Minister Yair Lapid announced via Twitter on Monday.

"Today, during our meeting in Jerusalem, Surinamese Foreign Minister Albert Ramdin informed me that his country plans to soon open an embassy in Jerusalem," Lapid said.

The Dutch-speaking country on the northeastern coast of South America will join the United States, Guatemala, Honduras and Kosovo, all of which have opened their missions in Israel's capital.

Some are wary of the backlash that comes with opening embassies within the controversial capital, with the Palestinians claiming its eastern part, hence several other countries have opened official trade and defense offices and branches of their embassies in Jerusalem, including Hungary and Australia.

Lapid and Ramdin signed a cooperation agreement between the two foreign ministries and Lapid offered to send foreign aid to Suriname to help deal with the impact of severe flooding that hit in March, affecting the eastern part of the country. The heavy rainfall left large portions of the country's residential areas, infrastructure, and agriculture industry in ruins. The government recently declared several districts as disaster areas.

Former U.S. president Donald Trump announced in 2017 that the U.S. embassy would be moving to Jerusalem, with other countries following the move or announcing that they were considering it.

Paraguay briefly opened its embassy in Jerusalem in 2018 before moving back to Tel Aviv.

Landmark Israel, UAE trade deal axes nearly all tariffs

UAE predicts the Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement will boost bilateral trade to more than \$10 billion a year within five years.

Israel signed a free trade agreement with the United Arab Emirates on Tuesday, its first big trade accord with an Arab state that reduces or removes tariffs and over time targets lifting annual bilateral trade to more than \$10 billion.

The pact was signed in Dubai by Economy and Industry Minister Orna Barbivai and her counterpart, UAE Minister of Economy Abdulla bin Touq Al Marri, after months of negotiations.

Tariffs will be eliminated on 96% of goods with the UAE predicting the Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement would boost bilateral trade to more than \$10 billion a year within five years.

Emirati trade minister Thani Al Zeyoudi said the trade deal wrote "a new chapter in the history of the Middle East."

"Our agreement will accelerate growth, create jobs and lead to a new era of peace, stability, and prosperity across the region," he wrote on Twitter.

Barbivai told Israeli radio on Tuesday she had heard "nothing out of the ordinary" about the Al Aqsa violence so far during her visit to the UAE.

President of the UAE-Israel Business Council Dorian Barak said the trade agreement defined tax rates, imports and intellectual property, which would encourage more Israeli companies to set up offices in the UAE, particularly in Dubai.

The council predicts there will be almost 1,000 Israeli companies working in or through the UAE by the end of the year doing business with South Asia, the Far East and Middle East.

"The domestic market doesn't represent the entirety of the opportunity. The opportunity is really setting up in Dubai, as many companies have, in order to target the broader region," Barak told Reuters by phone.

Emirati-Israeli trade reached \$1.2 billion in 2021, according to official Israeli data.

For oil-rich UAE, the deal with Israel is its second bilateral free trade agreement after signing a similar accord with India in February. It is in bilateral trade talks with several other countries, including Indonesia and South Korea.



The UAE has been aggressively pursuing these deals in a bid to strengthen its economy and status as a major business hub following the hit it took from the COVID pandemic.

Israel and the UAE established ties in September 2020 under the Abraham Accords.

Bennett shunned from traditional national-religious yeshiva J'lm Day event

President Herzog tells Religious leaders that those who hold different views, must not be excluded; cautions internal strife and hatred responsible for historic destruction of Jerusalem;

Prime Minister Naftali Bennett was excluded on Sunday from the traditional Jerusalem Day celebrations at a prominent religious Zionist Yeshiva.

This was the first time in that a prime minister was shunned by organizers at the Mercaz HaRav Yeshiva's annual event marking the reunification of Jerusalem.

President Issac Herzog, who spoke at the event hinted at Bennett's absence and said that those who hold different views must not be excluded.

"Israeli unity is sacred," Herzog said. "We must keep it strong, and we must fight against hatred and those who try to turn us against each other," he said in his speech.

"All of us must honor Israel's symbols of sovereignty and independence, which we have dreamed of for thousands of years. Unjustified hatred is what led to the destruction of Jerusalem, and if we are not careful, it will lead to it again. We all must be responsible, and put what is best for the people of Israel as a priority. In a diverse, democratic, and intense world like ours, criticism is allowed and even welcomed," Herzog said.

"We must remember that no one asked the liberators of Jerusalem during their heroic fight, as they risked and sacrificed their lives 55 years ago, what their political opinion was, whether they wear a yarmulke or not," he said.

Herzog also referred to the government's decision to allow the flag parade to enter the Old City through the Damascus Gate, and pass through the Muslim quarter, as has been the custom.

"Our connection to Jerusalem is eternal and inseparable. There is only one Jerusalem, and it is united and Israeli," Herzog said.

Mercaz HaRav is considered a prominent religious Zionist institution, founded by the spiritual leader of the settlement movement Rabbi Abraham Isaac Kook in 1924.

The fact that an invitation was not extended to the prime minister can be seen as an insult from the political right wing which has been critical of Bennett's coalition and blames him for the failure to form a right-wing and religious coalition under the leadership of Benjamin Netanyahu.

It was the target of a deadly terror attack in 2008 where eight people were killed when Palestinian gunman broke into the compound and opened fire.

Israel issues travel warning for Turkey fearing Iranian attacks

Israelis cautioned to avoid unnecessary travel to any country bordering Iran, asked to refrain from identifying as Israeli in public places including hotels and restaurants, amid growing concern following assassination of IRGC official

Israeli security officials on Monday, reiterated their warning against Israelis' travel to Turkey following the assassination in Tehran of an IRGC official, last week.

In a statement issued by the Prime Minister's office, security officials warned there was a real danger to Israelis on Turkish soil and in other countries who share a border with Iran.

The National Security Council called on the public to increase vigilance and take the necessary precautions.

Col. Hassan Sayyad Khodaei of elite Quds Force was shot five times outside his home in an attack attributed to Israel.

The security officials said they are reiterating their warnings after recent Iranian attempts to harm Israeli business people and diplomats serving in the Israeli consulate in Istanbul.

"In recent weeks, and more so since Iran blamed Israel for an assassination of a senior member of the IRGC, security agencies are increasingly concerned that Iran will target Israelis traveling abroad," the statement read.

"the NSC and security agencies want to make clear that Turkey is now considered at high risk for such actions."

The official warning calls on Israelis to avoid unnecessary travel to Turkey along with recommendations for stringent cautionary steps, which include avoiding contact with strangers, a suspicious approach to offers made by unknown individuals or entities, even if they appear to originate from Turkey.

The steps also call on Israelis not to reveal personal information and travel information or even specific locations, in advance, and to make sure they are in possession of emergency numbers and contact information for Israeli embassy and consular offices.

Israelis are also asked to refrain from revealing information pertaining to security matters or prior military service and urged to keep a low profile and not identify themselves as Israelis in hotels, restaurants or any other public venues.

The Shin Bet recently issued a warning to Israelis against Iranian attempts to lure them abroad under false pretenses and using false identities – in order to kidnap them.

MKs granted free vote on banning 'enemy flags' in state institutions

Controversial bill comes amid discussions in Knesset on freedom of expression and violence on campuses, prompted by several pro-Palestinian demonstrations in a number of prominent state-funded universities

Lawmakers would be able to vote their conscience on a controversial bill that plans to outlaw the display of "enemy flags" at universities or government institutions, the Ministerial Committee on Legislation decided Sunday.

The bill was tabled a little under a week after a demonstration at Be'er Sheva's Ben Gurion University saw hundreds of Bedouin students fly Palestinian flags on the occasion of Nakba Day — commemorating and lamenting the Arab defeat in the 1948-1949 war around the creation of Israel — and over two weeks after a similar controversial demonstration took place at Tel Aviv University.

The bill — sponsored by Likud MK Eli Cohen — will affect all universities and any state-funded institutions, and will come up for a reading in the Knesset plenum on Wednesday.

"The hypocrisy and the incitement from some Israeli Arabs must stop. They want to enjoy the budget of the State of Israel and at the same time defy the State of Israel and harm its sovereignty," said Cohen.

"Therefore, the bill I submitted will prohibit the hoisting of flags of enemy states, including the Palestinian Authority, in state institutions. Anyone who by the way sees himself as a Palestinian will receive from us all the assistance required to cross a one-way route to Gaza."

Joint List MK Ofer Cassif lambasted the proposed legislation, adding that "the decision of the Ministerial Committee to allow freedom of vote on the 'Flag Repression Law' is a continuation of [the government's] fascist line against the Palestinian people and their identity."

The Knesset Education Committee, meanwhile, held a discussion Sunday regarding freedom of expression, incitement and violence on campuses.

During the discussion, Ben Gurion University President Prof. Daniel Haimovich said: "The Palestinian flag threatens a large number of Jews. I understand it and it pains me. But that does not mean that there is violence on campus."

"This year we were presented with requests from two student groups on the left and right to hold demonstrations. As a lesson from last year, and in order to prevent violence and, God forbid, casualties, we created a dialogue and agreements with both groups," Haimovich said.

"The requests submitted with us did not include the hoisting of Palestinian flags. [When the flags were hoisted] we understood that this is in accordance with the law and that it was not possible to remove them. We acted in accordance with the law and the opinion of the Justice Ministry."

Bennett: Jerusalem to remain unified for all times, and the people of Israel united  
Prime minister also responds to comments by ultra-Orthodox rabbi calling senior cabinet members traitors and claiming they are worse than Nazis; police commissioner says his force deployed to prevent violence during Jerusalem Day celebrations

Prime Minister Naftali Bennett on Sunday said Jerusalem must remain a united city but so must the nation.

"Our commitment is to a unified Jerusalem for all times and a united nation, for all times," Bennett said in a memorial service to the victims of the exodus of Ethiopian Jewish out of Africa, and their immigration to Israel.

Israeli security sources were on high alert during Jerusalem Day events including the controversial Flag March scheduled to take place later in the day, which is expected to pass through the Muslim quarter of the Old City.

The route was approved by the police and the government after security assessments, despite appeals from the United States and European leaders to change its route in order to avoid friction.

Israeli leaders said the same route that had been used for the past 30 years will remain unchanged. Officials warned that if marchers are made to avoid parts of the Old City of

Jerusalem, it would be perceived as capitulation in the face of warnings from the Hamas terror group, to bring about a further escalation and possible rocket fire from Gaza.

Relatively few clashes were reported since Sunday morning between Palestinians who barricaded themselves inside a mosque on Temple Mount and police forces who then locked the rioters inside the mosque while Jewish visitors to the site were allowed to enter in small groups and for a limited time. Some 2,000 Jews visited the compound during the morning hours, while many more, waited outside.

Among the Jewish groups, police removed from the holy site some who demonstratively prayed out loud, and bowed in worship, in violation of the status quo on Temple Mount which allows Muslim prayer at the mosques compound and Jewish prayer at the Western Wall.

Police commissioner Kobi Shabtai said his force will thwart any attempts to provoke violence from Palestinians and Jews.

"We are prepared for any development and are in full control as our troops are deployed in all sectors," he said.

Extreme right legislator Itamar Ben Gvir criticized the police for what he called their soft hand against Muslim rioters during his short visit to the holy site.

Bennett also responded to comments made by a reputable ultra-Orthodox Rabbi who in a televised Torah lesson on Saturday, said senior government ministers were worse than the Nazis.

Rabbi Meir Mazuz, from the Shas party, said he hoped Bennett, Foreign Minister Lapid and Finance Minister Avigdor Liberman, "and their friends and the friends' friends, depart this world soon," and called them traitors.

Even in the heat of argument, "Bennett said, "we must not equate our brothers to our worst enemies," he said.
