Supreme Court rules Ukrainian refugees will be granted entry to Israel

Judges overturn Interior Minister Ayelet Shaked's controversial restrictive policy, meaning Ukrainian nationals once again able to travel and stay in Israel for up to three months without a visa like before outset of Russian invasion Gilad Morag Published: 07.03.22, 18:34

The Israeli Supreme Court on Sunday voted unanimously to overturn a policy limiting the number of Ukrainian refugees allowed to enter Israel amid the Russian invasion of the ex-Soviet nation.

The axing of the policy, which was put in place by Interior Minister Ayelet Shakked and set a quota of 5,000 entrants from the war-torn country, means Ukrainian nationals will be once again able to travel and stay in Israel for up to three months without attaining a visa like before the outset of the conflict.

The Interior Ministry will still be able to restrict entry to some Ukrainians contingent upon cooperation between the two countries and the approval of the Knesset's Internal Affairs Committee.

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky welcomed the ruling on Twitter. "I commend the decision of the Supreme Court of the State of Israel, which obliges the government of Israel to abolish any additional restrictions on the entry of citizens of Ukraine," he wrote.

"The rule of law and respect for human rights is exactly what distinguishes a true, developed democracy!"

The Jewish state revised its policy regarding the travel of Ukrainian nationals into the country after Russia launched its invasion of its Eastern European neighbor. Fearing a massive influx of Ukrainian refugees into the country, Shaked worked to draw up a "more balanced" policy on the issue, according to her, given that 90% of the refugees arriving in Israel are not eligible to immigrate according to Israel's Law of Return, which gives Jews, their children and grandchildren the right to relocate to Israel and acquire Israeli citizenship.

Under the now-canceled policy, first-degree relatives of Israeli citizens who aren't eligible to relocate under the Law of Return were only allowed to enter Israel under a 90day tourist visa, contingent upon their Israeli host's signature and their commitment to return to Ukraine at the end of the approved period of stay.

Ukrainians that do not fall under this category were questioned by border control upon arrival in order to ensure they have family in Israel. The refugee's host family were then asked to guarantee their departure from Israel, and put down a NIS 10,000 deposit per person to avoid overstaying.

The policy sparked an outcry in Israel, Ukraine, and worldwide.

Immigration lawyer Tomer Warsha, who petitioned against the move, argued it lacked any legal grounds and contradicts Israel's obligation to protect the right to life and security of Ukrainian civilians. On Sunday, the Supreme Court accepted Warsha's petition but noted the ruling does not diminish the interior minister's authority to block the entry of foreign nationals into the country on an individual basis and according to standard procedure.

"We're happy that Ukrainian citizens, who are still in the midst of war, will be able to find peace in the State of Israel alongside their relatives and friends," Warsha said.

Israel bracing for potential terror attacks during Biden visit

Police Commissioner Kobi Shabtai tells commanders to increase troop numbers in streets and maintain high level of alert; source says dozens of terror attacks foiled, some in major Israeli cities

Israel is said to be bracing for a wave of potential terror attacks during U.S. President Joe Biden's visit in the Jewish state next week.

Israel Police Commissioner Kobi Shabtaion on Sunday held high level briefing in preparation for the visit.

Sources in the force said the police was considering the possibility that Palestinian terror groups may attempt to strike while the president was in the country, and also target events hosting thousands during the summer holidays.

Shabtai discussed the threats with commanders in a zoom conference call. He apparently told them the forces on the ground must increase their presence and maintain a high alert. A source told Ynet that the police was aware of dozens of potential terror attacks all around the country.

"Since the last wave of terror, the police with its anti-terror unit and in cooperation with the Shin Bet, foiled dozens of attacks that were already set to take place," the source said. "The anti-terror unit conducted a number of arrests over the past weeks, of suspects seen as ticking time bombs, some of whom were found inside major cities in Israel and already prepared to launch attacks.," he said.

"The police is prepared to foil terror squads or loan actors using intelligence sources as well as boots on the ground, to foil any attack," the source said.

Israel intercepts 3 Hezbollah drones en route to contentious offshore gas field Fighter jets scramble to shoot down drones on their way to Karish gas field; Gantz says attack is an attempt by Iranian-backed proxy to undermine ongoing maritime border demarcation talks between Jerusalem and Beirut; Lapid: Do not try us Yoav Zitun| Updated: 07.02.22, 21:27

The Israeli military intercepted three Hezbollah drones Saturday evening as they were making their way from Lebanon to the Karish gas field, over which the countries have been locked in a protracted maritime border dispute.

According to the IDF, the drones flew at low altitudes and some at low speeds and no sub-explosions were caused after they were shot down by an Israeli Air Force fighter jet and an Israeli Navy corvette, indicating they were not carrying any explosives.

Security officials estimate the drones were launched with the aim of undermining the ongoing U.S.-mediated economic water demarcation talks between Jerusalem and Beirut. Defense Minister Benny Gantz blasted the Iranian-backed proxy after a situation assessment with the IDF top brass.

"The State of Israel is prepared to defend its infrastructure against any and all threats," Gantz said.

"Hezbollah undermines Lebanon's ability to reach an agreement on a maritime border that is vital to Lebanon's economy and its citizens, despite Israel's intentions to advance negotiations to resolve the issue."

In his first speech since coming into office, Prime Minister Yair Lapid issued a stern warning to Israel's adversaries, saying the Jewish state is ready to defend itself with force. "I say to all our adversaries, from Gaza to Tehran, from the shores of Lebanon to Syria, do not try us," he told reporters.

"Israel will know how to use its force in the face of every threat and foe." Last month, Lebanon invited U.S. energy envoy Amos Hochstein to Beirut after objecting to the arrival of a vessel operated by London-based Energean off the coast on June 5 to develop the disputed gas field. Lebanon President Michel Aoun said any activity in the area would amount to an act of aggression and provocation.

Hezbollah has previously warned Israel against drilling for oil and gas in the disputed area until the issue is resolved, and said the group would take action if it did so. Israel says Karish is part of its exclusive economic zone, but Lebanon says the field is in contested waters and should not be developed until the two countries conclude their indirect talks to delineate their maritime borders.

Those talks fizzled out last year after Lebanon pushed its claim in the disputed zone from a boundary known as "Line 23" further south to "Line 29," adding around 1,400 square km (540 square miles) to its claim, including part of Karish.

To overcome the impasse, Hochstein proposed a field-swap that would create an Sshaped boundary instead of a straight line, but Lebanon did not officially agree to the proposal, official sources said.

Yair Lapid became Israel's interim prime minister at midnight on Friday, replacing Naftali Bennett as the Israeli parliament (Knesset) dissolved.

Lapid will be the acting prime minister ahead of elections on November 1, with former prime minister Naftali Bennett stepping down after more than a year in a broad coalition.

This is in accordance with their coalition agreement, as the 24th K nesset dissolved on Thursday night.

Lapid earlier visited Yad Vashem Holocaust Memorial, honoring his father, a Holocaust survivor, and meeting with President Isaac Herzog and his wife.

US President Joe Biden sent early congratulations to the new leader of Israel, saying he looked forward to seeing both Bennett and Lapid in Israel, and thanked Bennett for his "friendship over the past year."

Bennett thanked Biden, telling him he looked forward to meeting him in Jerusalem, and that he was a "true friend" of Israel.

Lapid's first moves as prime minister revolve around security matters, including a meeting with the head of the Shin Bet domestic security agency and a meeting over the Israeli captives held in the Gaza Strip, The Times of Israel reported.

IDF escorts hundreds to shrine known as Joseph's Tomb on outskirts of West Bank city for religious festivities; brigade commander among injured as troops return fire and evacuates worshipers from the area

Palestinian gunmen opened fire at hundreds of Jewish worshipers at a shrine known as Joseph's Tomb outside the West Bank city of Nablus early Thursday, wounding three people, including a commander of the IDF brigade securing the visit.

Israeli troops returned fire and evacuated the worshipers from the site where some Jews believe the biblical Joseph is buried. Jewish worshipers often visit the shrine to pray escorted by the Israeli military.

The worshipers, numbering in the hundreds, entered the site under heavy military guard to celebrate a religious festival at the tomb which has taken on increased importance as a pilgrimage site in recent years.

The military said there has been a noticeable uptick in violence in the Nablus area in recent weeks and that they were investigating the incident.

Last month, a Palestinian teen was killed and at least 15 Palestinians were wounded in clashes with the military near the shrine, according to the Palestinian official news agency Wafa.

In April, Palestinians set fire to the shrine before they were dispersed by Palestinian security forces, an incident that drew condemnation from Israeli leaders.

The site was later patched up by a group of settlers led by Shomron Regional Council Yossi Dagan.

Dagan said at the time that Israel was asserting its sovereignty over the site by rebuilding what had been destroyed there.

Thursday's clash was the latest in a wave of violence that has persisted for months following a string of deadly attacks inside Israel, which left 19 people dead. The terror wave prompted Israeli counterterrorism raids across the West Bank.

Finance Minister and Yisrael Beytenu Chairman Avigdor Liberman said Tuesday that former Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu must be prevented from returning to power.

Bennett and Foreign Minister Yair Lapid announced their intention to dissolve the Knesset on Monday evening, triggering Israel's fifth snap election in just three years.

"This is the result of intrigues, lies and subversion of one man - Benjamin Netanyahu," Liberman said at the Eli Horowitz Conference for Economy and Society in Jerusalem.

"During [Netanyahu's] tenure, the Mount Meron disaster happened, a year ago he surrendered to the ultimatum of Islamic Jihad during the Jerusalem flag march everything is registered in his name."

Liberman added that preventing the former premier from returning to power was "the main" goal.

"If Netanyahu had really cared about the State of Israel, his camp and his party, he would have given up the leadership of the Likud party and the government, taking a time-out until the end of the legal proceedings against him," Liberman said, referring to Netanyahu's ongoing corruption trial.

"Whoever takes care of himself and his family above country - all other interests are simply irrelevant... I say that in all respects this man must not return. We will do everything to prevent this from happening - and as soon as possible we will form a government that can act on behalf of the citizens of Israel.

"Political instability hurts the society, the economy and security," the finance minister added. "The multi-year defense budget plan has been halted yet again, and I estimate that the defense establishment has been operating without it for more than five years." Liberman argued that the electoral system in Israel must change - but he does not believe that there is a majority in the Knesset to pass such a law. "In the end, the small parties always know how to blackmail the big ones and neutralize any initiative to ensure political stability."

The former prime minister made the comments shortly after Prime Minister Naftali Bennett and Foreign Minister Yair Lapid announced their intention to dissolve the Knesset, triggering Israel's fifth snap election in just three years.

"Something big has happened here today. People are smiling tonight because they feel we are getting rid of the worst government in the history of Israel," Netanyahu told reporters, adding that he will not form a coalition with the Islamist Ra'am party and its chairman, Mansour Abbas.

"This is a government that succumbed to terrorism, to blackmail, lost the ability to control the cities of Israel. The country has been yanked from under our feet by this government. There is a sense of loss of personal security - something that bothers everyone.

"The cost of living is setting new heights, there is loss of national pride and people who are afraid to wave Israeli flags."

Netanyahu added that Bennett's government doesn't care "for the citizens of Israel, the West Bank or anyone but themselves," and the state requires a "rehabilitation" and "fundamental correction".

"I intend to establish a broad, strong and stable national government. We are confident in our ability to win the election. But we have several times proposed to form a right-wing government in this Knesset that has a right-wing majority."

The move to dissolve the Knesset brings an end to the fragile governing alliance that consists of nationalist, centrist, left-wing and Arab parties and is held by little more than shared disdain for Netanyahu. Bennett unseated Israel's longest-serving premier in June of last year after 12 years in power.

Israel headed for elections as Bennett, Lapid announce plan to dissolve Knesset Coalition chiefs concede efforts to salvage government have failed; fresh elections to be held on either October 25 or November 1; Lapid to assume role of interim prime minister Ynet Updated: 06.20.22, 19:50

Prime Minister Naftali Bennett and Foreign Minister Yair Lapid on Monday announced their intention to introduce a bill that would dissolve the Knesset, triggering Israel's fifth snap election in just three years.

The two leaders of the coalition conceded that their efforts to salvage the government have failed.

The elections will be held on either October 25 or November 1. Under a power-sharing deal with Bennett, Lapid will assume the role of interim prime minister at least until a new government is formed.

The two will give a joint statement at 8pm.

Although the statement from the two stated that they had made the decision together, sources told Ynet that Bennett was the one who decided to call it quits in a last-ditch attempt to extend the emergency regulations that provide legal protections to Jewish West Bank settlers.

Israel captured the West Bank from Jordan in the 1967 Six-Day War but has never officially annexed the territory. Emergency regulations in place for decades apply parts of Israeli law to Jewish settlers in the West Bank.

If they are not renewed, that legal system will be thrown into question. It could also change the legal status of the 500,000 settlers living there.

An attempt to extend the regulations was defeated in a Knesset vote earlier this month after Arab coalition members broke party discipline and joined the opposition in voting against the bill.

As a result, MK Nir Orbach of Bennett's nationalist Yamina party announced last week he was boycotting the coalition until the regulations are extended.

Other attempts to pass a bill to extend these regulations have failed to muster a majority in the K nesset after several Arab and left-wing coalition members said they will not support the legislation.

The dissolution of the K nesset will now extend the emergency regulations automatically by at least several more months.

This brings an end to the fragile governing alliance that consists of nationalist, centrist, left-wing and Arab parties and is held by little more than shared disdain for former prime minister Benjamin Netanyahu. Bennett unseated Israel's longest-serving premier in June of last year after 12 years in power.

Shortly after the announcement, Justice Minister Gideon Sa'ar took to Twitter to pin the blame for the collapse of the government on the "irresponsibility of several lawmakers" and stated that his goal in the upcoming polls is to prevent Netanyahu from retaking the reins of power.

Netanyahu, who now acts as the leader of the opposition, welcomed his political rivals' decision to dissolve the Knesset and promised to form a "broad, nationalist government" that would "bring national pride back to the citizens of Israel."

"This is great news for the people of Israel. After a determined struggle of the opposition in the K nesset and great suffering of the Israeli public, it is clear to everyone that the worst government in the history of the country has run its course," he said in a recorded statement.

"A government that was relied on terrorist supporters, that abandoned the personal security of Israeli citizens, that raised the cost of living to levels we did not know before,

that levied unnecessary taxes, that endangered the Jewish character of our country. This government is going home." First published: 19:05, 06.20.22

Foreign Minister Lapid to visit Turkey this week warming NATO security ties

Foreign Minister Lapid to visit Turkey amid security jitters Foreign Ministry says Lapid will make snap visit to NATO-member country to meet with Turkish counterpart and demonstrate the cooperation between the countries in fight against terrorism Reuters, Itamar Eichner | Published: 06.19.22, 22:34

Foreign Minister Yair Lapid plans to visit Turkey this week, his office said on Sunday, after months of warming ties but also recent worries voiced by Israel that its citizens could come under attack by Iranian agents in the NATO-member country.

The statement said that Lapid, during his trip on Thursday, would meet with Turkish counterpart Mevlüt Çavuşoğlu, who last month visited Israel to encourage expanded economic cooperation.

Israel has warned its citizens against travel to Turkey, citing suspected assassination or abduction plots by Iran, which has vowed to avenge the May 22 assassination of a Revolutionary Guards colonel in Tehran that it blamed on Israeli agents.

Iran has not commented on the Israeli travel warning, which is currently focused on Istanbul. In a June 13 statement that did not name any other countries, Turkey's Foreign Ministry alluded to the warning and said it was a safe country with "cooperation mechanisms for the battle with terrorism".

Çavuşoğlu's visit was in the background of the warming of relations between Turkey and Israel and came two and a half months after the visit of President Isaac Herzog to Ankara.

Against the backdrop of the recently publicized Iranian plot to carry out terror attacks against Israelis in Istanbul, President Isaac Herzog spoke on Sunday with his Turkish counterpart Recep Tayyip Erdogan and thanked him for the efforts to thwart terrorist activities on Turkish soil.

In their conversation, President Herzog emphasized that the threat has not yet passed and that the counterterror efforts must continue. The two leaders agreed to continue working for peace and stability in the region by means of an open and ongoing dialogue.

Israeli government approves program to preserve heritage of Muslim world Jewry Millions to be allocated to document history and culture of Jewish communities from Iran and Arab countries in hope of ending its absence from public discourse Itamar Eichner Published: 06.19.22, 22:02

The Israeli government on Sunday approved a program to document and preserve the history and heritage of Jewish communities in the Muslim world.

The proposal, sponsored by Social Equity Minister Meirav Cohen and Culture Minister Hili Tropper, would allocate NIS 6.35 million (\$1.84 million) for "the national effort to preserve the story and heritage of Jewish communities from Iran and Arab countries, which are a cornerstone in the history of the revival of the Jewish people in its homeland, while giving real expression to the diversity of Israeli society, strengthening the sense of belonging of members and descendants of these communities, and as part of promoting social cohesion in Israel."

The program comes against the backdrop of several recent studies that found that 80% of high-school graduates in Israel believe the history of Mizrahi and Sephardic Jews is underrepresented in schools while the history of European Jews makes up an integral part of the curriculum in the country's education system.

The parliamentary teams working on the proposal seek to create a specialized archive for the heritage of Jewish communities from Iran and Arabi countries which will be a center for preservation and research of documentary films on Jewish history in those countries with the hope of prompting further research.

Social Equality Minister Cohen said she was saddened by the absence of the history and culture of these Jewish communities from the public narrative and but expressed hope the program would help push it to the fore.

Culture Minister Trooper called the program "a step on the road to amend" the exclusion of Jewish communities from the Muslim world from the "Jewish-Israeli story."

NATO warns of 'years-long' Ukraine war as Russian intensifies assaults

Secretary-general of the military alliance says 'we must not let up in supporting Ukraine' as war-ravaged country receives a significant boost from the European Commission, which recommended it for candidate status Reuters Published: 06.19.22, 14:08

The war in Ukraine could last for years, the head of NATO said on Sunday, as Russia stepped up its assaults after the European Union recommended that Kyiv become a candidate to join the bloc.

"We must prepare for the fact that it could take years. We must not let up in supporting Ukraine," Stoltenberg, the secretary-general of the military alliance, was quoted as saying. "Even if the costs are high, not only for military support, also because of rising energy and food prices."

British Prime Minister Boris Johnson, who visited Kyiv on Friday, also spoke of a need to prepare for a long war.

This meant ensuring "Ukraine receives weapons, equipment, ammunition and training more rapidly than the invader," Johnson wrote in an opinion piece in London's Sunday Times.

"Time is the vital factor," he wrote. "Everything will depend on whether Ukraine can strengthen its ability to defend its soil faster than Russia can renew its capacity to attack."

Ukraine received a significant boost on Friday when the European Commission recommended it for candidate status, a decision EU nations are expected to endorse at a summit this week.

That would put Ukraine on course to realize an aspiration seen as out of reach before Russia's Feb. 24 invasion, even if membership could take years. Meanwhile, Russian attacks intensify on Ukraine's battlefields.

The industrial city of Sievierodonetsk, a prime target in Moscow's offensive to seize full control of Luhansk - one of the two provinces making up the Donbas - faced heavy artillery and rocket fire again, the Ukrainian military said.

"Russian forces will likely be able to seize Sievierodonetsk in the coming weeks, but at the cost of concentrating most of their available forces in this small area," analysts at a Washington-based think tank, the Institute for the Study of War, wrote in a note. Serhiy Gaidai, the Ukrainian-appointed governor of Luhansk, told Ukrainian television: "All Russian claims that they control the town are a lie. They control the main part of the town, but not the whole town."

In the twin city of Lysychansk across the river, Gaidai said on the Telegram messaging app, residential buildings and private houses had been destroyed, adding, "People are dying on the streets and in bomb shelters."

Ukraine's military acknowledged that "the enemy has partial success in the village of Metolkine," just southeast of Sievierodonetsk.

Russia's state news agency TASS said many Ukrainian fighters had surrendered in Metolkine, citing a source working for Russian-backed separatists.

Russian missiles hit a gasworks in the district of Izyum to the northwest, and Russian rockets raining on a suburb of Kharkiv, the second-largest city, hit a municipal building, causing a fire, but no casualties, Ukrainian authorities said.

A fuel storage depot in the eastern town of Novomoskovsk exploded on Sunday, killing one person and injuring two, after it had been hit by three Russian missiles, the regional administration chief said in an online message.

Two top commanders of fighters who defended the Azovstal steel plant in the southeastern port of Mariupol have been transferred to Russia for investigation, TASS said.

More so, Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky, whose defiance has inspired his people and won global respect, said he had visited soldiers on the southern frontline in the Mykolaiv region, about 550 km (340 miles) south of K yiv.

"I talked to our defenders - the military, the police, the National Guard," he said in a video on the Telegram message app on Sunday that appeared to have been recorded on a moving train.

"Their mood is assured: they all do not doubt our victory," Zelensky said. "We will not give the south to anyone, and all that is ours we will take back."

Another video showed Zelensky in his trademark khaki T-shirt handing out medals and posing for selfies with servicemen.

Zelensky has stayed mostly in Kyiv since Russia invaded, although in recent weeks he has made unannounced visits to Kharkiv and two eastern cities near battles.

One of Russian President Vladimir Putin's stated goals in ordering troops into Ukraine was to halt the eastward expansion of the North Atlantic Treaty Alliance and keep Moscow's southern neighbor outside the West's sphere of influence. But the war, which has killed thousands, reduced cities to rubble and sent millions fleeing, has had the opposite effect - convincing Finland and Sweden to seek to join NATO - and helping to pave the way for Ukraine's EU membership bid.
